SBP Benefits are not automatic; you have to apply

Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) claims are not automatic. Proper paperwork must be submitted to ensure benefits will be paid to survivors. Also, there is a statute of limitations of six years for submitting a claim for SBP. This rule is written in 31 U.S.C. § 3702(b) and is called the Barring Act. This limitation rule states that if a claim is not submitted within six years of death, the claim is barred and DFAS does not have jurisdiction to consider it. Basically stated, if a claim is not submitted within six years these benefits are lost forever. For this reason surviving spouses will need to submit claims soon after the death of the retiree by completing the appropriate DD Form 2656 and submitting it to the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS). The retiree needs to ensure family members are aware of all SBP rules and contacts. Then, when the time comes, the survivors will know what to do. Another factor the retiree should consider is to ensure taking care of a new spouse when remarrying. After the loss of a spouse through death or divorce, when marrying again, be sure that any Survivor Benefits Plan (SBP) is updated to take care of new family members. Having current information in the system is essential to ensure proper execution of any benefits when the time comes. It's difficult to believe that survivor benefits would not be paid. However, due to not keeping information current, and not submitting the proper forms in a timely manner, we know of situations where survivors have been left with no financial benefits. Unfortunately, a surviving spouse, while dealing with the loss of a loved one, also found they were left without expected income. This is a tragedy that should never happen. Taking care of family members should be at the top of any priority list. If you have doubts about what you and your family have signed up for and are entitled to, call DFAS at 1-800-321-1080 today.

THE PAPERLESS AF AND IADT

IMPORTANT! There is a major change to Inactive Duty for Training (IADT), starting 01 Oct. Terms are changing and all documentation will be through AROWS – this includes roll calls and individual days that are currently on 105's. One of the most important changes is that an approved request to perform IADT must precede the certification of duty. Please read the docs at G:\AW_Airlift_Wing\CPTF_Comptroller\PAY\AROWS\IADT

USE DTS FOR LODGING

Effective immediately, TDY lodging must be booked through DTS or the CTO. Please see the JTR, Para. 1100, para. 2400, para. 4130. Authorizations will not be approved with lodging procured elsewhere. <http://www.defense-travel.dod.mil/Docs/perdiem/JTR.pdf>

GOING ON ORDERS? WE WANT TO PAY YOU!

He appreciates your volunteer spirit, but Col. Stark wants you to get paid, so E-Certify your orders. With the fiscal year coming to a close, Finance will be pressing even harder to get all orders closed out. If you do not have a CAC reader at home, please be sure to E-Certify your pay orders on base on the last day of duty. Orders must be signed both at the beginning and end of any order of 30 days or more ("long tour"). Be sure that your order has fully been signed prior to logging out of AROWS. If you need assistance, please get with your orderly room or contact the Finance office.

DTS NOTIFICATIONS YOU AREN'T GETTING

Which email address you use for your DTS profile has great consequences! That address is where DTS sends airfare itineraries and notifications such as re-

jected authorizations and vouchers and debt actions. If you are a traditional and you have your .mil address in DTS, you may not be receiving critical emails, so we recommend you use your personal email address.

REIMBURSABLE LODGING

When TDY and lodged off base, you cannot just stay anywhere you like and receive reimbursement – you must lodge in a suitable commercial establishment. The JTR has these restrictions, both for your health and safety and to protect the taxpayer. JTR, 4130 encompasses TDY lodging and para. J. specifically states, in summary, "When no commercial lodging facility is available or when there is a room shortage because of a special event, the cost of lodging obtained in other than a commercial facility is allowed. ... In these cases, the traveler must provide a written explanation that is acceptable to the AO."

TRAVELLING WITHOUT DTS ORDERS? DONT!

A DTS travel authorization sets funds aside to reimburse you for your travel expenditures. If you travel without those funds being set aside, you risk funds not being available for your voucher, especially with the current fiscal climate

PERFORMING DUTY WITHOUT PAY ORDERS? DON'T!

An AROWS pay order directs you to duty and ensures that you will be paid for that duty. Verbal orders of the commander (VOCO) direct duty, without a written order, only when time prevents the publication of written orders in advance. This should be VERY rare. Days and dollars are very tight and even being pulled back. If you work without a pay order being published, you risk not getting paid for that duty. This is not a scare tactic – it has true potential in the current climate



UPDATE YOUR EMAILS TO @MAIL.MIL

With the email migration, many systems, including AROWS and DTS, need updating with your new @mail.mil address, in order to continue to receive notifications. Again, traditionals are encouraged to use their home email for DTS. A living document on updating different systems is located at G:\AW_Airlift_Wing\CPTF_Comptroller\.

GTC PLASTIC BEING REPLACED

Citibank is going to the "Chip and PIN" credit cards for increased security. Currently, new and expiring accounts are receiving the new cards and all others will start receiving them soon, ahead of expiration. Two important actions are required by you: 1) ensure your address with Citi is current; 2) activate your card when you receive it and update the expiration in DTS. Lack of action in either of these will cause problems for you and your unit.



2015 Foodborne Germs and Illnesses

Foodborne Germs and Illnesses

Foodborne illness (sometimes called “foodborne disease,” “foodborne infection,” or “food poisoning”) is a common, costly yet preventable public health problem. Each year, 1 in 6 Americans gets sick by consuming contaminated foods or beverages. Many different disease-causing microbes, or pathogens, can contaminate foods, so there are many different foodborne infections. In addition, poisonous chemicals, or other harmful substances can cause foodborne diseases if they are present in food.

- More than 250 different foodborne diseases have been described. Most of these diseases are infections, caused by a variety of bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can be foodborne.
- Other diseases are poisonings, caused by harmful toxins or chemicals that have contaminated the food, for example, poison-

ous mushrooms.

- These different diseases have many different symptoms, so there is no one “syndrome” that is foodborne illness. However, the microbe or toxin enters the body through the gastrointestinal tract, and often causes the first symp-

toms there, so nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps and diarrhea are common symptoms in many foodborne diseases.

How does food become contaminated?

There are many opportunities for food to become contaminated as it is produced and prepared.

- Many foodborne microbes are present in healthy animals (usually in their intestines) that are raised for food. Meat and poultry carcasses can become contaminated during slaughter by contact with small amounts of intestinal contents.
- Similarly, fresh fruits and vegetables can be contaminated if they are washed or irrigated with water that is contaminated with animal manure or human sewage.
- Some types of Salmonella (<http://www.cdc.gov/salmonella/>) can infect a hen’s ovary so that the internal contents of a normal

looking egg can be contaminated with Salmonella even before the shell is formed.

- Oysters and other filter feeding shellfish can concentrate Vibrio (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/vibriop/>) bacteria that are naturally present in sea water, or other microbes such as norovirus that are present in human sewage dumped into the sea.

Later in food processing, other foodborne microbes can be introduced from infected humans who handle the food, or by cross contamination from some other raw agricultural product.

- For example, Shigella (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/shigellosis/>) bacteria, hepatitis A (<http://www.cdc.gov/hepatitis/ChooseA.htm>) virus and norovirus (<http://www.cdc.gov/ncidod/dvrd/revb/gastro/norovirus.htm>) can be introduced by the unwashed hands of food handlers who are themselves infected.
- In the kitchen, microbes can be transferred from one food to another food by using the same knife, cutting board, or other utensil to prepare both, without washing the surface or utensil in between.
- A food that is fully cooked

can become recontaminated if it touches other raw foods or drippings from raw foods that contain pathogens.

The way that food is handled after it is contaminated can also make a difference in whether or not an outbreak occurs.

- Many bacterial microbes need to multiply to a larger number before enough are present in food to cause disease. Given warm moist conditions and an ample supply of nutrients, one bacterium that reproduces by dividing itself every half hour can produce 17 million progeny in 12 hours.

- As a result, lightly contaminated food left out overnight can be highly infectious by the next day. If the food were refrigerated promptly, the bacteria would not multiply at all.

- In general, refrigeration or freezing prevents virtually all bacteria from growing but generally preserves them in a state of suspended animation. This general rule has a few surprising exceptions.

- o Two foodborne bacteria, *Listeria monocytogenes* (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/listeriosis/>) and *Yersinia enterocolitica* (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/yersinia/>) can actually grow at refrigerator temperatures.

- High salt, high sugar or high acid levels keep bacteria from growing, which is why salted meats, jam, and pickled veg-

etables are traditional preserved foods.

- Microbes are killed by heat.

- o If food is heated to an internal temperature above 160°F, or 78°C, for even a few seconds this sufficient to kill parasites, viruses or bacteria, except for the *Clostridium* (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/botulism/>) bacteria, which produce a heat-resistant form called a spore.

- *Clostridium* spores are killed only at temperatures above boiling. This is why canned foods must be cooked to a high temperature under pressure as part of the canning process.

- o The toxins produced by bacteria vary in their sensitivity to heat.

- The staphylococcal (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/staphylococcal/>) toxin which causes vomiting is not inactivated even if it is boiled.

- Fortunately, the potent toxin that causes botulism (<http://www.cdc.gov/nczved/divisions/dfbmd/diseases/botulism/>) is completely inactivated by boiling.

Food Safety

- **Cook:** cook to the right temperature

- **Clean:** wash hands and surfaces often

- **Chill:** refrigerate food promptly

- **Separate:** separate raw meats from other foods

She jumped right in from day one. Yvonne Downs had already made Nevada Air National Guard history when she became both the 152nd Airlift Wing's first female and the first civilian environmental manager in June, 2015.

Due to an organizational change, her environmental manager position now reports directly to the Base Civil Engineer (BCE) in the Civil Engineer Squadron, Room 15, Bldg. 88.

Deputy BCE Lt. Col. Robert Nicholas, P.E., described her previous sixteen-year career as environmental manager (EM) for the Hawthorne Army Depot, as "extraordinary." "The 152nd Airlift Wing is hugely strengthened by obtaining Ms. Downs' visionary talents and incomparable experience," said Nicholas. "She is a Certified ISO 14001 lead auditor. This means that she has vast, proven experience in the regulatory requirements of Environmental, Safety, Fire and Emergency Services, and Bio-environmental functions." In fact, Downs was the first to implement Fence-to-Fence ISO 14001 in the entire Army, thus saving thousands in environmental costs and tracking. Ms. Downs holds a Master of Science Degree in Environmental Management. Nicholas summarizes, "Downs epitomizes absolute conviction in her position as Environmental Manager."

The majority of her EM work will be conducted with the Military Managers of Satellite Accumulation Points (SAPs) around the base. The environmental manager is re-

sponsible for overseeing: air quality, waste, hazmat, water, soil, Environmental Baseline Survey Updates, and EESOH-MIS. The EM maneuvers her way through the maze of complex, multi-level, federal, state and county Environmental Regulations to ensure the highest compliance by this Air National Guard Installation.

Among numerous agencies, she works with the EPA, OSHA, NGB A7, Nevada State Department of Environmental Protection, Nevada State Historical Preservation Office, and many others. She advises the BCE on projects and is a non-voting, contributing member to the 152nd Airlift Wing Facilities Board. The EM works in close concert with

the Nevada Air National Guard Real Property Office. As EM, she enables managers to navigate through the rules to ensure that new construction, demolitions, and renovation actions on federal Real Property are carefully documented in concurrence with applicable environmental regulations. Ms. Downs was preceded in this position by Lt. Col. Kevin Knuf and Lt. Col. John Peck.

Her list of “extreme” experiences in EM reads like a tantalizing Tom Clancy novel. She discovered hidden chemicals from the 1940’s on Army property. She learned firsthand how to properly dispose of massive quantities of spent lithium from federal military land. She undertook remediation of explosives and POL spills from public, state and federal spills. As the Army’s Manager of Range Scrap, she successfully processed hazardous spent munitions for recycling. She operated hazardous waste incinerators; open burning and open detonation of munitions; Water Treatment Facility; recycling conventional munitions, and continual monitoring of military compliance.

Yvonne strongly promotes teamwork to ensure that everyone is “on-the-same-page” and all enjoy an improved understanding of each person’s special contribution to the matter under discussion. “Come-one-come-all,” she says of her inclusive, open door policy in Civil Engineer Squadron Room 15. “I’d love to talk over environmental issues and regulations with you,” Yvonne offers. “You have new ideas or approaches? WHERE ARE AUBURN AND BROOKLYN, NEVADA

As a docent for the Nevada Historical Society we are honored to have speakers come to our meetings and talk about different aspects of Nevada. Ed Dybowski came on October 7th and talked about the little known communities of Auburn and Brooklyn, Nevada. The towns were located in the Reno area in the 1860's and are now part of Reno. Here are the histories of Auburn and Brooklyn, Nevada:

Auburn, Nevada

After an English mining and milling company built a 20mill stamp at the north end of the Truckee Meadows in 1865, the mill camp of Auburn sprang up. It died when Reno was founded in the spring of 1868, though the mill continued to operate during the 1870's and into the 1880's. Reno's growth overtook the site by 1951. The camp was located behind the Sak N' Save on Oddie Blvd.

Brooklyn, Nevada

Initial mining efforts began in 1875 when the New York Co. opened a tunnel on the south side of Peavine mountain. John Chisholm Smyles surveyed and laid out a town site named Brooklyn after the New York Co. Before its abandonment two years later it boasted of a boarding house, company stops, shanties and stables. Though the company spent much time and development little low grade ore was actually found. The mine flooded out and all the assets were sold and the town disappeared. The original site of Brooklyn is where the Somerset housing development is today. You can still find rusted artifacts if you look carefully.

The talk was very interesting because it brought out some little known facts about our Reno area. *(Source: Notes taken from historical talk by Ed Dybowski at the Nevada Historical Society October 7, 2015.)*

First some news for Summer Students that have applied for Textbook and Tuition Reimbursement: The summer payments are currently on hold as there were more applications submitted than funding available. NVNG has requested additional funding for the program and is awaiting a decision. Should the program not receive any additional funding, the reimbursements will all be paid based on the percentage of funding available. (So no-one will be denied, the payment amounts will all be reduced by the same percentage.)

The fall holidays are upon us, which means it is also time for the fall textbook reimbursement packets and the spring tuition waivers to start rolling in. I want to put out a few reminders about the two programs.

First of all, let's cover the Textbook Reimbursement packets: Per TAG-NV guidance, all packets MUST be typed, hand-written packets will be rejected. Packages must also use the most current forms, which are available via the Nevada National Guard webpage under "Education Benefits". <http://www.nv.ngb.army.mil/nvng/> Packages must be submitted by the deadline date, late packages will be rejected. The deadline for the fall Textbook Reimbursement packets to be turned in to the Retention Office is January 10, 2016. Ensure you use the TEXTBOOK REIMBURSEMENT CHECKLIST and attach all the required documents in order. The completed package is submitted to the Retention Office for processing.

For the Tuition Waiver packages, they are also available on the same website above; however, we no longer use the social security number. When you submit your tuition waiver, we must have your DOD ID Number from the back of your CAC. If you hand write the application, write your DOD ID Number on the form right below your signature. If you fill it out and electronically sign it, the DOD ID Number is listed in the signature block so no further action is needed.

For both the Textbook Reimbursement Packet as well as the Tuition Waiver Forms, once you have signed the forms, you must have your unit representative sign the form before bringing it to the Retention Office for processing.





Virtual Record of Emergency Data (vRED)

Record of Emergency Data - What is it?

The virtual Record of Emergency Data (vRED) satisfies the requirement of the DD Form 93 and is the official source document required by law for Airmen to provide the Air Force emergency contact information and beneficiary designations in the event an Airman becomes a casualty. Benefits include unpaid pay and allowances and a \$100,000 death gratuity to aid survivors in meeting immediate expenses.

Please keep in mind the Death Gratuity benefit is only paid if the Airman dies while in military status or traveling to/from military status (AFI 36-3002, Casualty Services, para 4.9)

AFI 36-2254, Reserve Personnel Participation Volume 1 for AFR and ANGI 36-2001, Management of Training and Operational Support within the Air National Guard for ANG, defines status as:



Active Duty (AD)

- Military Personnel Appropriation (MPA) / Reserve Personnel Appropriation (RPA) orders/Active Duty for Operational Support (ADOS)
- Annual Training (AT) or Special Training (ST)
- TDY
- Full-time National Guard duty
- Active Guard/Reserve; Reservist
- Active Guard/Reserve; Guardsmen

Active Duty for Training (ADT) for AFR or Formal School Training (FST) for ANG

- Technical School

Inactive Duty Training (IDT)

- Unit Training Assembly (UTA)
- Readiness Management Period (RMP)
- Additional Flying Training Period (AFTP)
- Additional Ground Training Period (AGTP)

Important Information

When important life-changing events such as marriage/divorce or a change in address/contact information occurs, vRED should be updated as soon as possible. Delays in next of kin notification are most often associated with incomplete or outdated information. Completion and annual validation of the vRED is mandatory and ultimately each Airman's responsibility. Having a complete and accurate vRED ensures the Air Force Casualty Services Branch can provide prompt and accurate casualty reporting, dignified and humane casualty notifications, and thorough and compassionate follow-on assistance to surviving families.
