

### Fugett posthumously awarded with the Legion of Merit

RENO, Nev. - Col. Michael A. Fugett, former Commander of the 152nd Operations Group, was posthumously awarded the prestigious Legion of Merit on April 5, 2025. His family accepted the award during a ceremony at the Nevada Air National Guard base. This high honor, one of only two U.S. military decorations worn as a neck order (the other being the Medal of Honor), recognizes Fugett's exceptional service and leadership from October 2022 to May 2023.

Fugett's impact on the Nevada Air National Guard was profound. He championed his Airmen, focusing on both their present needs and future readiness, expertly guiding them through complex operations while simultaneously preparing for future challenges. His forward-thinking approach garnered crucial sup-

port from Nevada Senator Catherine Cortez Masto and Congressman Mark Amodei, paving the way for modernizing the state's airlift fleet.

Among his many accomplishments, Fugett spear-headed the deployment of four C-130H aircraft and 140 Airmen to the U.S. Africa Command Air Expeditionary Force, strengthening key alliances vital to national defense. A true leader by example, he inspired his team to achieve an "excellent" rating during the 2023 Wing Readiness Exercise.

# High Rollers Flight Crew, Operations, and Maintenace Teams Complete MAFFS Spring Training at Channel Islands

NEVADA AIR NATIONAL GUARD BASE, Reno, Nev. (April 28, 2025) — Military and civilian flight crews wrapped up a week of aerial wildfire suppression training Sunday, concluding the annual Modular Airborne Firefighting Systems spring training at Channel Islands Air National Guard Station in Southern California.

The training, which ran April 22–27, brought together personnel from the USDA Forest Service and other federal agencies, along with Airmen from the Nevada Air National Guard's 152nd Airlift Wing, the Wyoming Air National Guard's 153rd Airlift Wing, the Air Force Reserve's 302nd Airlift Wing from Colorado, and the California Air National Guard's 146th Airlift Wing.

The Modular Airborne Firefighting Systems (MAFFS) training recertified military C-130 aircrews, civilian lead plane pilots and federal and state support personnel to respond to wildfires when commercial air tankers are unavailable.

Col. Catherine Grush, commander of the 152nd Airlift Wing, praised the longstanding partnership. "Our citizen Airmen are grateful for the opportunity to work with all agencies involved and to support our neighbors in their times of need," Grush said.

Over the course of the exercise, crews completed 84 training sorties, logged nearly 129 flight hours, and executed 478 practice water drops, totaling 235,327 gallons. Practice drops were conducted in designated remote areas of the Angeles National Forest in Los Angeles County, where residents may have noticed low-flying aircraft during the week.

Training was extended through April 28 to allow Colorado Springs-based crews additional flight time after weather and aircraft maintenance delayed operations earlier in the week. Aircraft and personnel from Nevada and Wyoming completed their training and returned home April 27, while Colorado crews are scheduled to depart April 28.

The MAFFS units, owned by the Forest Service,

can discharge their entire load of up to 3,000 gallons of retardant in less than five seconds, covering an area one-quarter of a mile long by 100 feet wide, or they can make incremental drops. Once a load is discharged from a MAFFS-equipped aircraft, and the aircraft lands at a tanker base, it can be refilled in less than 12 minutes. The modular systems are loaded into the back of military C-130 Hercules aircraft and provide critical surge capacity during peak wildfire activity.

"The MAFFS program is a unique and vital mission, and it's a privilege to be part of it," said Lt. Col. Matthew Schwegel, a pilot with the Nevada Air National Guard's 152nd Airlift Wing. "Our crews take tremendous pride in being trained, ready, and able to answer the call when the nation needs us."

This year, MAFFS-equipped aircraft were already activated early, supporting firefighting efforts in January on the Palisades and Eaton Fires in the Los Angeles area.

Final certification numbers for crews qualifying for the 2025 fire season will be released at a later date.





#### **Strengthening Leadership in the Fire Service**

Leadership is critical to the success and safety of fire service operations. Every five years, fire chiefs, deputy chiefs, and station chiefs are required to attend the Chief Firehouse Course — a comprehensive orientation designed to strengthen leadership skills, improve departmental operations, and foster collaboration across the fire service community.

This essential, week-long course is offered three times annually at various locations, including Andrews Air Force Base and along side the Fire Marshals' Orientation Course in Eastern Washington. A third session, referred to as the "floating" session, allows flexibility to meet regional needs. Taught by experienced instructors from diverse fire service backgrounds, the course offers invaluable real-world insights to both attendees and instructors alike.

The curriculum covers a wide range of leadership and operational topics, including budget prepara-

tion, safety program development, and community risk assessments. Participants are encouraged to share knowledge and best practices, ensuring every department benefits from collective expertise and experiences.

Beyond technical skills, the course inspires future leaders by emphasizing continuous improvement and the importance of effective, proactive leadership. It provides a forum for fire chiefs to reflect on their own practices, build new professional connections, and return to their departments better equipped to face the challenges ahead.

Whether attending or instructing, the Chief Firehouse Course offers a dynamic and rewarding experience to firefighters. It remains a cornerstone for advancing leadership excellence in the fire service and reinforcing the strong, interconnected community among fire service professionals.



# 192nd Airlift Squadron Welcomes New Commander in Change of Command Ceremony

# Mustache March : A Tribute to Air Force Legacy and the Legend of Robin Olds

RENO, Nev. - In the U.S. Air Force, the month of March carries a special tradition: Mustache March. What began as a lighthearted tribute has become a meaningful celebration of heritage, camaraderie and Air Force legacy.

The tradition honors legendary "Triple Ace" Col. Robin Olds, a fighter pilot known as much for his bold tactics as for his iconic handlebar mustache. Olds' career reached new heights during Operation Bolo in 1967, when he led the 8th Tactical Fighter Wing—nicknamed the Wolfpack—on a daring mission over North Vietnam.

Operation Bolo proved to be a turning point in the air war. Under restrictive rules of engagement, U.S. pilots could not strike enemy aircraft unless provoked. Olds devised a plan to disguise F-4C Phantom jets as F-105 Thunderchiefs, mimicking flight paths, call signs and electronic signatures familiar to the North Vietnamese.

The ruse worked. MiG-21 fighters rose to intercept what they believed were vulnerable bombers, only to be ambushed by the better-equipped Phantoms. The U.S. downed seven enemy aircraft without suffering a single loss, crippling half of the North Vietnamese MiG-21 fleet.

Olds' mustache became a symbol of defiance and

independence. He once remarked, "What was anybody going to do—send the secretary of the Air Force over to knock me out, sit on me and shave it off? It became the middle finger I couldn't raise in PR photographs."

Despite the rebellious image, Olds respected authority. When Gen. John P. McConnell, chief of staff of the Air Force, ordered him to shave, Olds complied. "It was the most direct order I had received in twenty-four years of service," he later said.

Today, Mustache March serves as more than just a nod to facial hair. It honors the courage, creativity and spirit of leaders like Olds—those who pushed boundaries while serving with integrity.

As Airmen grow mustaches each March, they remember the legends who came before and the values that continue to guide the force. In the skies and in spirit, the mustache remains a subtle symbol of excellence, resolve and the unique heritage of the United States Air Force.

### 232nd Combat Training Squadron Holds Aerial Change of Command Near Nellis AFB

NEVADA AIR NATIONAL GUARD BASE, Neva-The 232nd Combat Training Squadron conducted a rare and visually striking aerial change of command ceremony near Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, on April 18, 2025. The sky above the Nevada desert served as the stage for a six-ship formation flyover, led by outgoing commander Lt. Col. Jay "Grizz" Baer.

One F-16D Fighting Falcon, two F-22 Raptors, two F-35A Lightning II aircraft and one A-10C Thunderbolt II, all flown by Air National Guardsmen, soared in tight formation as a final tribute to Baer's leadership. The flyover served as both a ceremonial and symbolic passing of the torch to the unit's new leadership.

Following the aerial display, a traditional change of command ceremony was held on the flight line of Nellis AFB. There, Baer formally passed the squadron's guidon to Col. Erik Brown, the 152nd Operations Group Commander, who briefly held command before handing the symbol of leadership to the incoming commander, Lt. Col. Kevin "Renegade" Autrey.

"This ceremony, both in the air and on the ground,

reflects the legacy, pride and precision of the 232nd," said Brown. "It's a staunch reminder that with the transition of leadership, the mission and dedication of our Airmen continues - without fail."

Aerial change of command ceremonies are a rare tradition within the U.S. Air Force, typically reserved for highly specialized or commemorative occasions. Originating from early flyovers during World War II, these airborne tributes have evolved into complex aerial displays that showcase unit capabilities while honoring outgoing leadership. Though more common in ground-based ceremonies, aerial versions emphasize a squadron's operational readiness and offer a dramatic visual farewell.

The 232nd Combat Training Squadron, known for its role in integrated air combat training exercises like Red Flag, continues its mission of preparing warfighters for the most complex combat scenarios in modern air warfare. Under the Nevada Air National Guard, the 232nd also is a part of the 152nd Airlift Wing based out of Reno, Nev.



### **Key Spouse Program Rebranded**


The Department of the Air Force recently announced the Key Spouse Program is changing to the Commander's Key Support Program.



# ONLINE UNIFORMED SERVICES ID CARD (USID) RENEWAL

### **USID CARDS**

- Issued to retired and reserve uniformed Service members, dependent family members, and other eligible individuals in accordance with DoD policy
- Used for access to benefits, privileges, and DoD facilities

### **CURRENT RENEWAL PROCESS**

- Must be done in person at a RAPIDS site
- Often requires an appointment scheduled in advance
- No opportunity to renew online



### **WHAT'S CHANGING?**

- Sponsors can request card renewals online, from anywhere
- Cards will be mailed to the cardholder via US mail
- No in-person requirement for most renewals



### REQUIREMENTS

- Sponsor must be a CAC holder or have a DoD Self-Service Logon username/password
- Must be requesting a renewal of an active USID card
- Sponsor and Cardholder must have email addresses listed in DEERS that they have authorized DoD to use for contacting them
- . Sponsor's personnel status must extend at least 30 days into the future
- Cardholder has a photo saved in DEERS taken in the last 12 years
- Cardholder's mailing address is present in DEERS and is in United States
  - USID cards cannot be shipped to PO Boxes

  - o If accessing from your phone, you will need the Microsoft Authenticator app
  - o After scanning the QR Code, be sure to open it up in a browser so you can navigate to the Authenticator application.
- Log on with DS Logon or CAC.
  - o If you do not have a DS Logon, click "Create New Account" and it will prompt you to create one.

#### Send a Message to the 152d Medical Group!

#### You can now send your outside health records via the Messaging function in MHS GENESIS!

- In your MHS GENESIS Patient portal, click "Messaging" at the top of the screen, then click "Send a message."
- Fill in the required fields. (In the "To" box, type in <u>152</u> and click "Air Natl Guard 152 MDG Readiness")
- Attach files you want to be input into your medical record.
- You may also use this function to request appointments.
